OUR CARE

Shipston Home Nursing provides 'hospice care at home' for patients and their families facing incurable illnesses. This means we care for people who want to stay at home in the last weeks or days of their lives. Our nurses and healthcare assistants provide palliative care, symptom control, personal care and respite visits. We offer emotional support to families and carers too.

All our care is provided FREE of charge and our Nursing Service operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. We offer this support to people living within the areas marked on this map, or who are patients of our partner GP's.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Our patient numbers continue to grow with 167 patients and families cared for in 2024 through our Hospice at Home Service and a further 29 through our Bereavement and Counselling Services.

During 2024 we met and began care for 102 new patients all of whom had been diagnosed with illnesses which were incurable and no longer responding to treatment. Our aim is to introduce ourselves to all patients, assess their needs and agree an initial plan of care within 24 hours of the patient being referred to us for support. The care we provide is very much based on the nature of the patient's illness and we always consider what the patient wants and how their family wish to help support their ongoing care.

We are often asked to describe exactly what a Hospice at Home Service does. It's a difficult question as our care is specific to each individual patient. However we can broadly describe what we do as, Nursing Care and Symptom Control, Personal Care, Night Care, Respite Support, Emotional Support, Pre and Post Bereavement Support, Liaison, Advice and Signposting with all other stakeholders as part of a multi-disciplinary approach to caring for the whole family.

The notion of end of life care at home can understandably be daunting and we acknowledge that this is not a service that is suitable for everyone. It is dependent on the nature and severity of illnesses alongside the available family support structure. Of the patients we care for, around 85% achieve their ambition of being nursed




full term at home with hospice or hospital inpatient units or nursing home care being other options if needed. End of life care at home provides familiarity, flexibility and can be managed safely. with patients supported by our 24 hour helpline. Our helpline is managed by one of our own Nurse Coordinators who will provide advice and, if required, visit patients whatever time of the day or night it happens to be. I recognise that contacting a hospice is a brave step but I would encourage anybody facing the need for the type of care we provide to telephone us for a 'gentle' conversation.

Through our fundraising efforts and the generous support we receive from donors and grant making bodies, we are still financially healthy and finished our 2023-24 financial year with an operational loss of £28,538 and a positive net income of £30,938 after accounting for gains and losses on fixed asset investments.

Our patient facing, fundraising

and operations teams continue to work tirelessly to maintain and improve the high standards we want to be recognised for. As always, my thanks go to them for their efforts and dedication. Similarly, without our loyal groups of volunteers, trustees, donors, personal and business supporters, our future would be bleak. My thanks also go to you all

MARGARET'S STORY

Margaret Lowndes was born on the 21st March 1944. She had a zest for life and travel and, along with Alan, her husband of over 50 years, they had three wonderful children of whom she was immensely proud. Margaret lived with her daughter Alison, husband Paul and her beautiful grandchildren Sophie and Harry. This is her story, as told by her daughter, Alison. We are very grateful to Alison for sharing this with us

"Mum had Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease. During a routine check-up, they found a shadow on her lung. She was immediately booked in for surgery and spent Christmas 2022 in hospital recovering. After being given the all-clear in April 2023, we went on a girl's trip to Spain where she admitted to discovering a lump. Several tests later, it was confirmed the lump was cancerous.

Just before Christmas 2023, mum started to become unwell, and she was admitted to hospital for the second Christmas in a row. The tumour was underneath her right armpit and needed regular dressing by the district nursing team. Unfortunately, after many emergency visits to hospital, mum was unable to return home as she needed more specialist and around the clock care. The hospital wanted to discharge her, but I knew we needed some help, and that

is when we were introduced to Shipston Home Nursing.

Initially, mum wasn't sure whether she needed their care. However, it soon became clear that the Shipston Home Nursing nurses ('angels on wheels' as we referred to them) were absolutely what she needed. The nurses arrived promptly, always well-presented and with a friendly smile. They offered advice and care to my mum who was extremely poorly and vulnerable. They brightened our days with their cheery nature and gave such strength in our hours of need. Unfortunately, mum's tumour continued to grow, and she experienced a catastrophic bleed. She was rushed into hospital and, from there, to Myton Hospice in Warwick so that her symptoms could be managed in a specialist clinical environment. I was becoming mum's carer and knew

we wouldn't have long left with her. I wanted to become her daughter again. She died on 7th May 2024.

I would like to thank Shipston Home Nursing for taking care of mum and for their amazing support in our darkest months. Until you're in the position of watching a loved one go through a terrible time, you don't realise how special the Shipston Home Nursing team are. We live our lives without thinking about the important role they have day in day out and the lasting effect they leave on you. We will be forever grateful for their total love, care and absolute dedication to client care and consideration.

We ran the Shipston Home Nursing 10K last September at Walton Hall and are continuing our running and training towards keeping fit and healthy and another 10K later this year. We will continue to support their amazing work.




MERCHANDISE & WALK BOOKS
